If you want to experience a fun, free, family-friendly day out featuring loads of adventure and outdoor activities, then don't miss *Jewels In The Crown* on Sunday, March 10 at the iconic Queen Elizabeth Park.

Jewels In The Crown is a fantastic opportunity to come and experience something new in one of the most popular regional parks in Wellington region. With its 650 hectares of easy terrain edged by a sandy beach, Queen Elizabeth Park has plenty of space to enjoy swimming, fishing, walking, cycling, horse riding, picnics or group activities.

Grab an open day 'Parksport' and collect stamps as you explore. There's something for people of all ages – visit the Kapiti Stables; watch the aero modellers annual rally; and take part in a treasure hunt.

The park is steeped in history including pa sites at Whareroa and Wainui beaches and evidence of the 20,000 strong US marine camps from World War II. The Tramway Museum is situated near the MacKays Crossing entrance, with historic trams running along the 2 km line to Whareroa Beach.



Plus there will be other events during the day so grab a picnic and come down and visit.

As well as being a memorable day out for families, Jewels In The Crown is also a chance for people to discover amazing places and love their parks. The natural character of the park is influenced by Kapiti Island, the beach and the rolling coastal dunes. The park is popular year round, but particularly during the summer months to take advantage of the picnicking, swimming and beach activities. Queen Elizabeth Park also has a long association with equestrian events, attracting riders from

around the region.

Free shuttle buses will run on a loop hourly between the Paekakariki Train Station, Mackays Crossing and Wellington Road entrances between 10am and 3pm. Half-price tram rides will be operating throughout the day adults \$6, children \$3.
